MASTER CLASS INSTRUCTOR: René Saldaña, Ph.D.

Dr. René Saldaña, Jr., is the author of several books for children and young adults, among them *The Jumping Tree*, *The Whole Sky Full of Stars*, the bilingual *Mickey Rangel* mystery series, and the bilingual picture book *Dale, Dale, Dale: Una fiesta de números/Hit It, Hit It, Hit It: A Fiesta of Numbers*. He is an associate professor who teaches in the Language, Diversity, and Literacy Studies at a west Texas university. He currently also serves as the Program Coordinator for the LDLS program. His research looks at the use of culturally relevant literature in the largely underrepresented classrooms as a way to improve children's reading abilities. He is also conducting research on children's literacy success through the use of the weeklong, uninterrupted read-aloud model, a model he and a colleague, Dr. Ana Torres, have developed.

Alan Cumyn is the author of the beloved Owen Skye children's novels—*The Secret Life of Owen Skye*, *After Sylvia* and *Dear Sylvia*—which combined have either won or been short-listed for twelve national awards in Canada. He has also authored seven wide-ranging novels for adults including *Burridge Unbound*, a Giller Prize finalist, and *The Famished Lover*, longlisted for the International IMPAC Dublin Literary Award. His first YA novel, *Tilt*, was named one of the top works for young readers in 2011 in the U.S. by Kirkus Reviews and in Canada by Quill & Quire. *Hot Pterodactyl Boyfriend*, his latest release, was inspired by a talk given by Libba Bray at VCFA in 2012. The premise is unusual: a sexy and charismatic pterodactyl comes to high school and completely disrupts the well-planned graduating year (and love life) of student body chair Shiels Krane. Beneath the surface, this startlingly original book, which Maximum Pop in the UK has called “the most outrageous novel of the year”, is about how unconscious desires steer our lives in unknown ways. Alan lives in Ottawa, Canada. He taught English in China and Indonesia, ran a group home in Toronto, and for eight years wrote on international human rights issues for the Immigration and Refugee Board of Canada. He has an M.A. in Creative Writing from the University of Windsor, has taught at the Humber School for Writers and the Banff Centre, and he has served most recently as writer-in-residence at Berton House in Dawson City, Yukon. Alan is also a recent past Chair of The Writers' Union of Canada, and is currently the faculty chair for the MFA program in Writing for Children and Young Adults at VCFA. Louise Hawes is the author of two short fiction collections and over a dozen novels. Her work, for readers of all ages, has won awards from Banks Street College, the NJ Council on the Arts, the New York City Public Library, the Children's Book Council, the Independent Booksellers Association, and the International Reading Association, among others. *Black Pearls*, *A Faerie Strand* (Houghton Mifflin), a collection of retold fairy tales, earned the Gold Award, Hall of Fame at teenreadstoo.com. In 2012, Louise joined forces with four other authors to produce *A Flight of Angels* (DC Comics, Vertigo), a collaborative graphic novel named one of the Ten Great Graphic Novels of 2013 by the American Library Association. Most recently, her work has been included in the 2015 YA anthology, *Things I'll Never Tell; Stories of Our Secret Selves*. And in 2016, a multi-format novel (prose, poetry, and playscripts), *The Language of Stars*, was published by Simon & Schuster's Margaret K. McElderry Books.

Louise helped found and teaches at, the Vermont College of Fine Arts MFA in Writing for Children and Young Adults program. She has also served as a John Grisholm Visiting Author at the University of Mississippi, a Read in Common Author at the Mississippi University for Women, and a Writer in Residence at the University of New Mexico, Albuquerque. She has also guest lectured at UNC-Chapel Hill, UNC-Charlotte, Duke University, Meredith College, Staten Island University, and the University of Southern Florida.



Julie Larios taught for seven years on the faculty of VCFA's MFA/Writing for Children and Young Adults program. She is the author of four prize-winning books of poetry for kids, and her poems have been widely anthologized. In addition, she is the winner of a Pushcart Prize and an Academy of American Poets Prize for her poems for adults, which have twice been chosen for the Best American Poetry series. More recently, she has been a contributing editor at the online international literary journal, *Numero Cinq*. She lives in Seattle.
